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## Wilderness areas under threat from global redistribution of agriculture

As the climate warms, crop production will increasingly shift into wilderness areas. It is predicted that within the next 40 years, around 7 million square kilometers of wilderness will become suitable for agriculture. The high-latitude wilderness in the northern hemisphere is particularly vulnerable to this emerging threat. The expansion of agriculture is a key threat to wilderness areas.

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## Declining population and GDP growth

Business people and politicians seem to fear a shrinking population may trigger an economic recession. This paper explores how countries with declining populations experience changes in GDP, GDP per capita, unemployment, and labor force participation. It shows that population decline can go hand in hand with rising GDP, increased per capita GDP, higher labor force participation, and decreased unemployment.

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## The ecology, distribution, conservation, and management of large old trees

Large old trees are some of the most iconic biota on earth and are integral parts of many terrestrial ecosystems. This paper found that large old trees play an extraordinary range of critical ecological roles, including in hydrological regimes, nutrient cycles, and numerous ecosystem processes.

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## Ecological Footprint and Sustainable Population

With humanity currently in overshoot, societal changes must be enacted to return to sustainable levels. To achieve the necessary level, a country's ecological footprint or population size could be altered; however, combined efforts on both fronts would be the most effective.

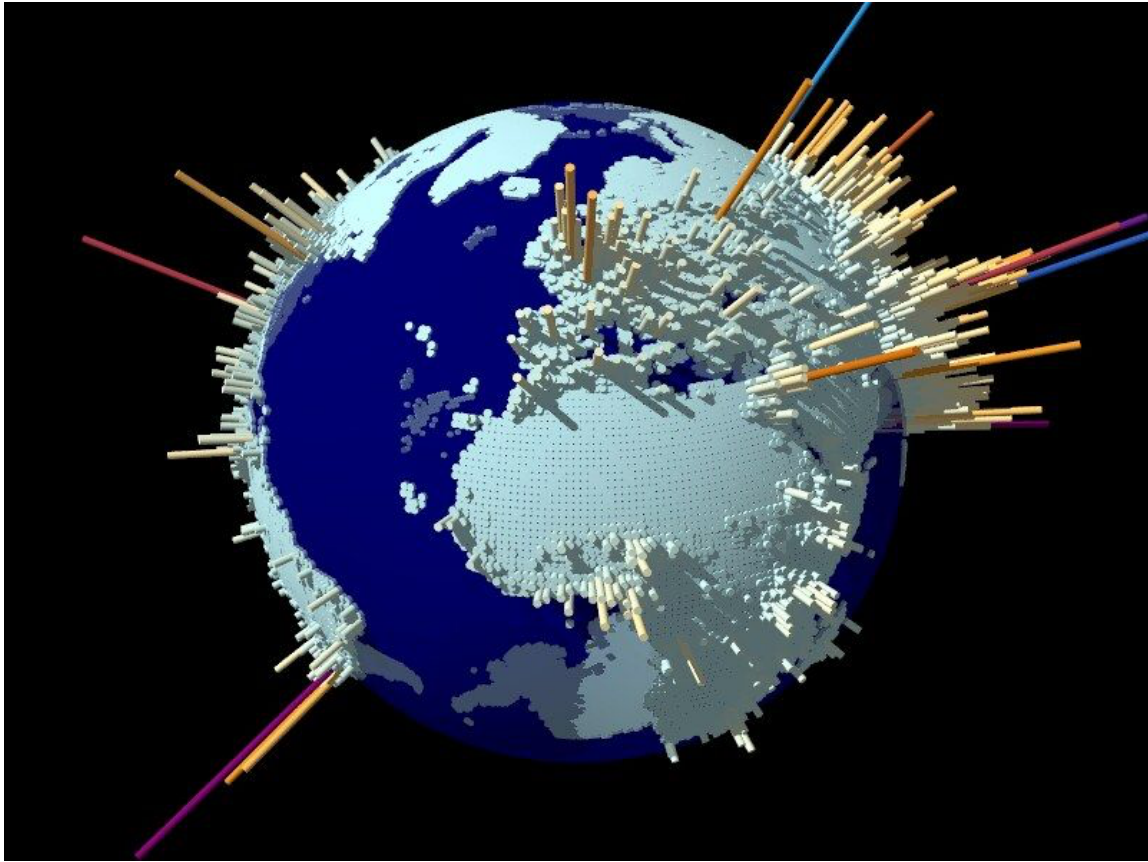
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## Future of the human climate niche

Humans have historically lived in a narrow range of climates with annual mean temperatures of around 13°C. Due to population growth and warming, 1 to 3 billion people may face conditions outside of this range in the next 50 years. Without intervention, many will experience temperatures warmer than any currently experienced.

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## Planet Earth: Habitat for Humanity Only?

It's all about us, baby! The extent to which we have reversed the typical size and food pyramid is evident when considering our biomass – the weight of all humanity on Earth. Human biomass constitutes approximately 33% of terrestrial mammalian biomass, while domestic animals make up almost 66%, and wild animals only about 4%.

Here's a disturbing fact: Prosecutors in the United States charge more penalties for the activists who reveal animal cruelty crimes than they do for the factory farms that commit them. This trend is a glaring miscarriage of justice and it must be reversed.
